aori All Blacks boss Clayton McMillan will coach Samurai International at the 34th GFI HKFC 10s (April 3-4) as the famous invitational side bid to win the Bill Burgess Cup for the first time, having reached the final in 2010, 2013 and 2016.

McMillan is head coach of Bay of Plenty in New Zealand's Mitre 10 Cup and has included many of his Steamers players for the 'World's Best 10s' at Hong Kong Football Club, where Samurai won the second-tier Plate last year with an all-Fijian side led by Sevens legend Nasoni Roko.

Towering Samoa lock **Kane Leaupepe** and Tonga No. 8 **Zane Kapeli** are among the non-New Zealanders in the Samurai squad, while



Samurai coach Clayton McMillan, who has been the head coach of Bay of Plenty since 2015 and Maori All Blacks since 2017

Wellington hooker **James O'Reilly**, a Hurricanes regular last year, and Wellington No. 8 **Teariki Ben-Nicholas**, in the Hurricanes Wider Training Group this year, are among the non-Steamers.

Samurai last fielded a Kiwi-dominated squad at the GFI HKFC 10s in 2010 when they had **Sam Cane**, the Bay of Plenty and Chiefs stalwart who has won 60 caps for the All Blacks. "We hope to have a couple more Sam Canes in this year's squad," said Samurai founder **Terry Sands**.

As fifth seeds, Samurai are in Pool D with fourth seeds Mourant Fiji Army, captained by **Isake Katonibau**, who helped Fiji win the last four Hong Kong Sevens.

Biarritz Gavekal are again top seeds as they bid for a third successive Cup title and will return with many of the same key players including captain Nick Smith, Bay of Plenty flyhalf Jason Robertson, and former Fijian Sevens player Samu Bale. Tradition YCAC, who lost 24-17 to Gavekal in last year's final, are seeded second and return with a strong squad including brothers Kylem and Declan O'Donnell, both former New Zealand Sevens players.

Two-time champions Grove Penguins are seeded third and will meet Asia Pacific Dragons in Pool C after the three-time champions were seeded sixth after missing last year's event.

Our own Natixis HKFC, who won the fourth-tier

Shield last year and are seeded 14th this year, have even secured Samoa legend **Alesana**Tuilagi, who helped the APDs win the GFI

HKFC 10s in 2014 and should prove a handful!

Irish Vikings, the 15th seeds, have lined up **Jesse Houston**, who played for New Zealand in the 2017-18 World Rugby Sevens Series, and **Blake Barrett**, younger brother of All Blacks Beauden, **Scott** and **Jordie**.

Cardiff back-rower **Sam Pailor** will represent Vikings for a third year, while the squad also includes three Kiwis from Hong Kong Grand Championship winners HKU Sandy Bay – forwards **Lawrence Babe** and **Ashton Hyde** and flyhalf **Nik Cumming**.

Rugby Legends Tackle Cancer Charity Match

This year's GFI HKFC 10s will have a special feature on the Thursday afternoon – the Rugby Legends Tackle Cancer Charity Match, kicking off at 3.50pm.

Created to raise money for the tournament's official charity, the Hong Kong Cancer Fund, many sevens and 15s rugby legends have committed their time for free to participate in a fun match that should prove a highlight of the two days.

Early confirmations included two of the bestever sevens players: England's **Ben Gollings**,

the all-time leading scorer on the World Rugby Sevens Series, and New Zealand's DJ Forbes, who won six Series titles.

David Campese, one of the greatest backs of all time and a Rugby World Cup winner, will also lace up his boots along with fellow Wallaby Justin Harrison, the towering lock who helped Australia reach the Rugby World Cup final in 2003.

Fiji back Sam Viriviri, the 2014 World Rugby Sevens Player of the Year, is also committed along with former England backs Rob Vickerman, Tom Varndell and Andy Goode, Scotland's Jim Hamilton, the 6ft 8in lock who won 63 caps, and former New Zealand fullback Terry Wright, a Rugby World Cup


HKFC join The Club of Pioneers

In February the HKFC joined this network as the founding football club in Hong Kong!





he 2019 edition of the Masters Hockey Indoor World Cup tournament had 26 teams from 9 countries – USA, Canada, Australia, Germany, Holland, Switzerland, Italy, England and Hong Kong – competing in different age groups – Mens O40 and O50, and Ladies O40 and O45.

There were a total of 94 games of indoor hockey played over four days at Shek Kip Mei Sports Centre, Island East Sports Centre and the host venue, Hong Kong Football Club.

After the qualification matches at the different venues, the finals were played at the Club and all four age groups (Mens O40 and O50, Ladies O40 and O45) were won by the highly impressive German teams. It's fair to say, age was no barrier for some and the quality of play, particularly in the finals, was exceptionally skilful and entertaining.

Hong Kong exceeded pre-tournament expectations to win a Silver Medal in the Mens O40, with Holland (LO40) and Switzerland (MO50), and Germany O55 (LO45) also winning Silver medals. This was enjoyed even more given the double wins over Australia in both pool play and the semi-final.

Australia won all four Bronze medals in their play-off games which also featured England, Canada, and USA teams.

Over 350 international visitors to Hong Kong were also able to enjoy a night at the Hong Kong Races and a trip to the Carnival at the Harbour Front, were treated to the Lion Dance at the Club, as well as being a significant presence at the Coffee Shop and Sportsman's Bar over the days of the event.
